AMERICA 250 Dates in April 1776:

During April 1776, crucial actions taken by the Patriots turned a rebellion for rights into a war for TOTAL independence!

April 6: In direct defiance of the British Prohibitory Act, the Second Continental Congress voted to open American ports for all foreign trade **EXCEPT** Great Britain. This was a declaration of economic independence.

April 12: North Carolina became the first colony to explicitly authorize its delegates to vote for Independence through “The Halifax Resolves”, setting a precedent for other colonies to follow.

April 13: After the Brits evacuated Boston, General George Washington and the Continental Army arrived in New York City to fortify the city in anticipation of the next major British attack.


April 17: The American 16-gun *Lexington*, commanded by John Barry, captured the British support ship *HMS Edward* off the coast of Virginia. This was one of the first captures of a British warship by a commissioned American vessel.

This month, John Adams wrote "Thoughts on Government". He argued the primary purpose of government is to promote the happiness of the people through a republican system - based on virtue. Adams advocated for a balanced government with three independent branches—executive, legislative, and judicial—and two branches of legislature to check ambition.

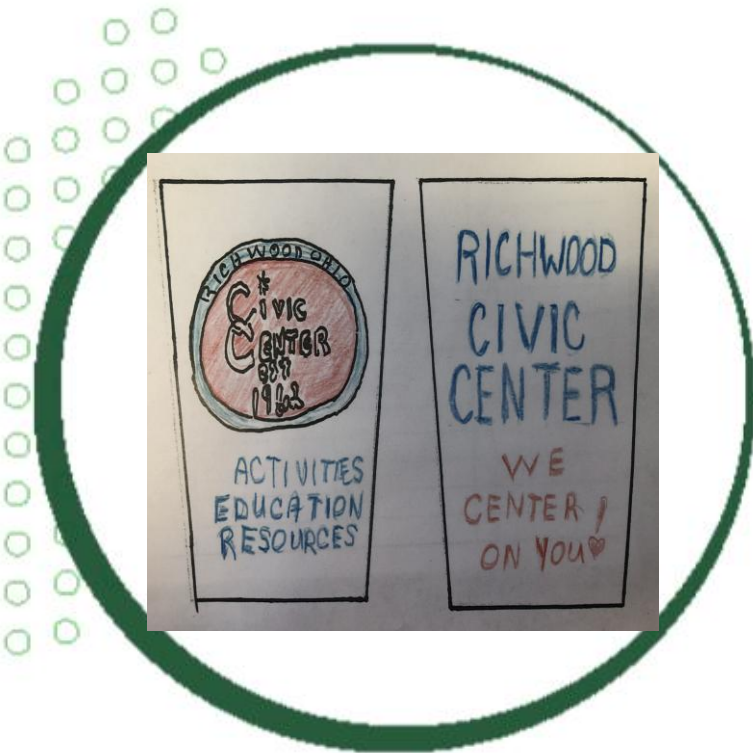

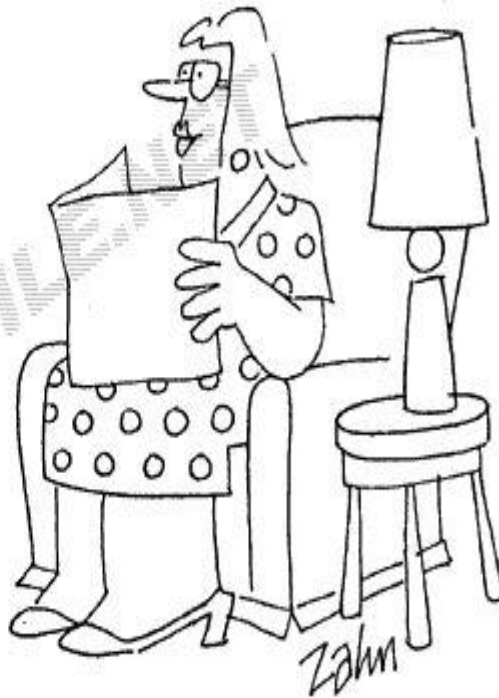
Wanna go to a Pizza Party and Fellowship Time?

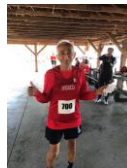

Heating Assistance Available
Application Deadline: May 31, 2026

The Ohio Department of Development and Bridges Community Action wants to remind older Ohioans that assistance is available to help with their home energy bills. The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) helps Ohioans at or below 175% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines for a household of up to eight members and 60% of State Median Income for a household of nine or more members to pay their heating bills.

Applied directly to the customer's utility or bulk fuel bill, the benefit can help manage heating costs. Older Ohioans may go to their local Area Agency on Aging office for help with assembling the required documents and completing their HEAP application. They may also visit www.energyhelp.ohio.gov to apply online or to download a copy of the application.

When applying, individuals need to have copies of the following documents:

- Most recent utility bills.
- A list of all household members (including birth dates and Social Security numbers).
- Proof of income for the past 30 days for all household members (12 months for certain income types).
- Proof of U.S. citizenship or legal residency for all household members.
- Proof of disability (if applicable).

HEAP benefits are applied to an individual's energy bill after Jan. 1. Applications for the HEAP program must be received by May 31, 2026.

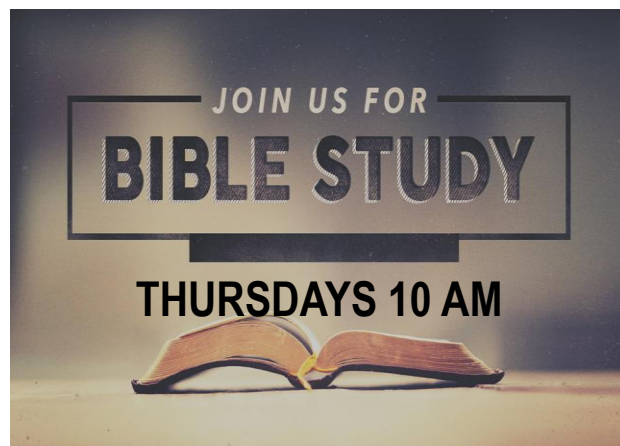

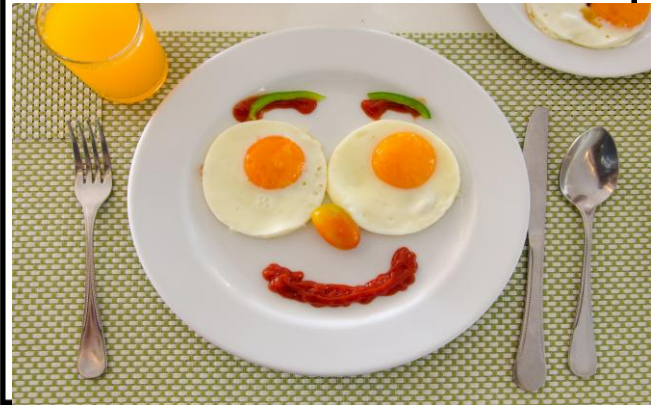

Eat this to Reduce Pain Levels, Managing Chronic Pain

Living with chronic pain can feel overwhelming, but the good news is that small, intentional changes to your diet can make a big difference. The food you eat not only fuels your body but can also influence your pain levels and inflammation. By focusing on nutrition for pain management, you can take an empowering step toward improving your well-being. Let's explore how thoughtful dietary choices can help reduce pain and support a healthier, happier life.

- ◆ Omega-3s are a powerhouse nutrient known for their ability to reduce inflammation. Fatty fish such as salmon, mackerel, and sardines are excellent sources.
- ◆ Plant-based options like flaxseeds, chia seeds, and walnuts are also great for fighting inflammation. Including these in your diet a few times a week can help ease chronic pain.
- ◆ Spinach, kale, broccoli, and brightly colored vegetables like bell peppers and carrots are rich in antioxidants. These nutrients combat oxidative stress in the body, which is a major contributor to inflammation and pain. Adding a variety of these vegetables to your meals ensures you're getting a range of nutrients.
- ◆ Whole-wheat bread, quinoa, lentils, and chickpeas are excellent sources of fiber, which helps regulate blood sugar levels and reduce systemic inflammation. Swapping out refined carbs for whole grains can make a noticeable difference in your pain management journey.
- ◆ Extra virgin olive oil, avocado, and flaxseed oil are rich in healthy fats that promote anti-inflammatory responses. These fats are a staple of the Mediterranean diet, which has been praised for its benefits in reducing chronic inflammation and pain.
- ◆ A study by the American College of Sports Medicine showed that tart cherry (TC) juice has many antioxidant and anti-inflammatory compounds. Research has found that 8-12 ounces of non-concentrate TC (1 ounce if in concentrate form) twice a day is good.



Replace processed foods with whole grains. Include fatty fish like salmon or sardines in your meals twice a week. Add a handful of leafy greens to your daily routine. Remember, you don't have to overhaul your diet overnight. Small, consistent changes can build lasting habits.
